Education

These programs cover therapeutic techniques, crisis intervention, medication administration, and patient psychology, often supplemented with on-the-job training for hands-on experience in mental health settings.

Certification

Certification for psychiatric technicians is often optional but beneficial for career advancement, showing competence in the field. Some states or employers may require certification, like the Certified Psychiatric Technician (CPT) from the American Association of Psychiatric Technicians (AAPT).
